FEATURE STORY: FUNDING FOR THE 2025-2026 SCHOOL YEAR

Earlier this summer, Governor Tony Evers declared 2025 the "Year of the Kid," centering his 2025–27 biennial budget around pro-child investments at every developmental stage. The bipartisan budget, signed into law in July 2025, includes over \$360 million for the state's child-care industry—about a third allocated as direct payments to providers—and historic increases in K-12 education

funding and special-education reimbursement rates, along with the largest boost to the University of Wisconsin System in nearly two decades. Households benefit from reduced costs through elimination of sales tax on residential energy and tax relief for working- and middle-class families. The budget also strengthens mental-health services in schools and expands access to healthcare and local infrastructure support. Evers emphasized this budget fulfills his commitment to investing in children and families, making 2025 a milestone year for youth-focused policymaking here in Wisconsin.
